Online Serivce



KINGS, PROPHETS, & PROSTITUTES

Kings: The Messy Path That Leads to the Messiah.

Matthew 1:1a New International Version

This is the genealogy of Jesus the Messiah

Matthew 9:27 New International Version

As Jesus went on from there, two blind men followed him, calling out, "Have mercy on us, **Son of David!**"

Matthew 12:23 New International Version

All the people were astonished and said, "Could this be the **Son of David**?"

Matthew 15:22 New International Version

A Canaanite woman from that vicinity came to him, crying out, "Lord, **Son of David**, have mercy on me! My daughter is demon-possessed and suffering terribly."

Matthew 20:29-31 New International Version

As Jesus and his disciples were leaving Jericho, a large crowd followed him. Two blind men were sitting by the roadside, and when they heard that Jesus was going by, they shouted, "Lord, **Son of David**, have mercy on us!" The crowd rebuked them and told them to be quiet, but they shouted all the louder, "Lord, **Son of David**, have mercy on us!"


2 Samuel 7:11b-13 New International Version

At that time Jesus went through the grainfields on the Sabbath. His disciples were hungry and began to pick some heads of grain and eat them. When the Pharisees saw this, they said to him, "Look! Your disciples are doing what is unlawful on the Sabbath."

He answered, "Haven't you read what David did when he and his companions were hungry? He entered the house of God, and he and his companions ate the consecrated bread—which was not lawful for them to do, but only for the priests. Or haven't you read in the Law that the priests on Sabbath duty in the temple desecrate the Sabbath and yet are innocent? I tell you that something greater than the temple is here.



Home Group Notes

Pray: It is always good by having someone begin group with prayer and invite the Spirit to join in on your group. (It may help to ask someone else ahead of time, some people like to prepare.)

Intro: (Totally Optional) Split into two groups and read the genealogies of Jesus, one group the Matthew account, and the other group the Luke account. Each group write or draw out the genealogy and then compare them. Or watch the Bible Project videos covering them. (They are pretty epic.)

- How are they similar? How are they different?
- Do you think the author's intended audience makes a difference?
 - (Matthew most likely wrote to a Jewish audience, Luke to a gentile audience.)

Questions: Below are some good discussion questions. You are by no means bound to them, but use them to guide your conversasions. These are a tool until they are not, use them as such.

- Why is it so important Jesus is in the line of David? What is so significant about David?
- Who are some of the other kings in Jesus' genealogy? Are they mostly good kings or bad?
- What does Jesus' family history mean for Him? How do the kings before Him set Him up?
- Do you think your family history affects you? If yes, how so?
- Are you continuing a relationship with God in your family, or are you a first generation disciple or Jesus?
- Who in your family history do you want to be like most?

Pray Again: You can never pray too much, but this is a good time to ask if there are anything the group can be praying for. Leaders, be sure to take some notes and pray for your group throughout the week. Don't forget to follow up with each other when you see God working and answering prayers.
